- Reports help future members plan activities, knowing what was done in the past and what was or was not successful.
- Reports are useful for membership recruitment efforts, allowing potential members to gain a realistic picture of the club's purpose.

- Reports are necessary to compete for recognition and awards on the district, state, and international levels of GFWC.
- Reports provide critical statistical information to help GFWC represent the membership to national policy makers and to receive grants and partnerships with national organizations.
- Reports document the club's non-profit organization status.

Well, our reports are submitted and here's a summary of what our club members achieved in 2023:






District 12 Director's Report

It's February and time for our District 12 Meeting and Art Competition on Friday, February 16th. Thank you so much for signing up to attend. We will have a good group of about 60 GFWC Sisters together for the meeting.

I am sorry to share sad news about the current status of Healing Art Missions in Haiti. Last year due to extreme civil unrest, they were forced to close the clinic in Dumay, but with the help of charitable foundations, they began the use of a Mobil Unit that traveled outside of the rebellion areas to hospitals farther south where their medical assistance was critically needed. That is no longer a viable alternative, due to danger and financing. We could still support their education program for the Charles Salomon School and the clean water filtration systems in the mountainous community of Demier.

In April 2016, our good friend and club member Judy Laing introduced us to Healing Art Missions, a nonprofit organization formed by her daughter, Tracee Laing, M.D., in 1999 to serve the medical needs of the people in Dumay, Haiti. Since that time, GFWC Rotonda West Woman's Club has attempted to provide support to H.A.M. although life and political conditions in Haiti have become critical for Haitians, at the same time that we had our own struggles with Covid and Hurricane Ian. Below are excerpts of a letter received February 1st from Dr. Tracee about the very current and sad circumstances for H.A.M.



Dearest Friends,

We write today with important news about Healing Art Missions' programming in Haiti. As you know, HAM has served communities in Haiti for 25 years and, over those years, the focus and nature of our


work has shifted due to circumstances in the country and their impact on our staff and operations.

As we begin 2024, HAM finds itself at an inflection point. Although we were able to successfully implement new programs, and even grow, in 2023, we recognized that, due to ongoing challenges in Haiti, our growth trajectory is not sustainable, and we need to right-size the organization now in order to meet our upcoming financial obligations.

HAM's supporters have been incredibly generous in 2023 supporting the work of the new Mobile Medical Team, but as Haiti's situation has deteriorated, we have also seen a corresponding reduction in donations from foundations and other entities which have previously been open to funding Haitian causes. We no longer can finance this program with individual donations alone.



Thus, HAM has made the difficult, but necessary decision to phase out medical programming in 2024 and to focus on our two other partner communities in Haiti which have no other partners.

Clean water and basic healthcare in Demier: HAM is the only NGO which supports the rural mountainous community of Demier. With our support, the community has access to water filtration systems and basic healthcare. HAM will remain a partner to the hundreds of families in Demier to ensure they have access to these basic human needs.

Our goal has always been, and still remains, to help the Haitian people to the best of our ability with the resources we have available to us. At this time, focusing our financial and staff resources on the communities of Port-de-Paix and Demier will enable us to continue to achieve that objective.

Thank you for your continued support and for your commitment to the people of Haiti. We are both available to answer questions or provide additional information; our email addresses are below and we welcome your outreach.




"The Radium Girls" by Kate Moore

Environmental Fun Facts

The environment around us is full of amazing features and facts you might not know. One of the best ways to appreciate the earth around us is to learn more about how we interact with nature. Here are some cool environmental facts you might not know:

1. Around 27,000 trees are cut down each day

The world has over 3.04 trillion trees in the world. However, 27,000 of them are cut down daily to make toilet paper. This translates to about 9.8 million trees annually. One single recycled edition of the New York Times newspaper could save 75,000 tree

2. Humans use only 1% of all available water

About 71% of the earth is water. The oceans hold approximately 96.5% of this water and the ice caps hold about 2%. The remaining water exists in rivers, ponds, glaciers, ice caps, lakes, as water vapor and our taps, among other water bodies. Only 1% of the earth's water is safe for human consumption.

3. 78% of marine mammals are at risk of choking on plastic

Seventy-eight percent of marine mammals are at risk of accidental deaths, such as getting caught in fishing nets. Plastic bags and other plastic garbage that ends up in the ocean kill over 1,000,000 sea animals every year.

4. Americans throw away 25 trillion Styrofoam cups every year Styrofoam is not biodegradable. Switching to single use options will help cut down on Styrofoam pollution.

5. Fungi play a highly vital role in the environment

Fungi play a protective role in the environment. From digesting minerals out of rock formations to consuming fossil fuel spills, and even de-radiating the environment

6. Ants weigh more than humans

The combined weight of ants on the planet is higher than all human beings. The world has over 7 billion people, and 100 trillion ants.

7. Every three months, Americans throw enough aluminum in the landfills to build our nation's entire commercial air fleet.

Recycling one aluminum can save enough energy to run a TV for three hours. During the time it takes you to read this sentence, 50,000 12-ounce aluminum cans are made.

8. On average, one supermarket goes through 60 million paper bags each year.

One of the best ways to cut down on single-use bags-both paper and plasticis to switch to reusable.

9. A glass bottle can take up to 1 million years to decompose.

Glass takes a very, very long time to break down. It can take a glass bottle more than a million years to decompose in the environment, possibly even more if it's in a landfill. This means that glass manufactured and used 5000 years ago may still be present in the environment. Because its life cycle is so long, and because glass doesn't leach any chemicals, it's better to repurpose and reuse it over and over again before recycling it.

10. Recycling one glass bottle saves enough energy to power a normal light bulb for about four hours.

While glass does not decompose easily, recycling it might be more beneficial to the environment. The recycling of one glass bottle not only saves energy but the energy saved can also power a normal light bulb for about four hours.

11. The world's oldest trees are 4,600 year old Bristlecone pines in the USA.

The Great Basin Bristlecone Pine (Pinus Longaeva) has been deemed the oldest tree in existence, reaching an age of over 5,000 years old. The Bristlecone pines' success in living a long life can be attributed to the harsh conditions it lives in. Very cold temperatures associated with high winds, in addition to a slow growth rate, create dense wood, meaning some years they grow so slowly, they don't add a ring of growth. 12. If you walk a mile along an average US highway, you will see, on average, about 1,457 pieces of litter.

According to Keep America Beautiful, if every American picked up 152 pieces of litter at the same time, we would have a litter-free nation.


13. Paper from trees can be recycled 6 times.

Paper comes from trees and can be recycled a maximum of six times, after which, its fibers become too weak to hold together. Learn More

14. There is a giant floating patch of garbage

The Great Pacific Garbage Patch is a twisting and turning vortex composed of trash and waste. It is twice the size of continental America and contains about 100 million tons of garbage, it stretches from the West Coast of North America to Japan along the Pacific Ocean.

We wore our Love, Respect and Kindness Club shirts and helped direct visitors to the Butterfly Garden, the Labyrinth on the Hill, and also let them know when and where to meet guided walks for butterflies, aquatic life, plants and trees. This year some walks will deal with Water Quality and the fact that the Preserve has been developed to purify water runoff from inland sources that flow into the ponds where it is filtered by many native plants before flowing out to Lemon Bay and beyond.



Through our Environment CSP, we have been invited to be greeters once again and are welcome to have our own Club Brochures on hand to introduce GFWC RWWC just as the local environmental groups, who will have exhibits providing information and demonstrations on programs such as oyster gardening!

It was fun and it was helpful to Lemon Bay Conservancy, all of whom are volunteers, just as we are. Let's do it again. We need about 5 or 6 volunteers. 














ROAD CLEANUP

Furry Scurry


The Furry Scurry was held Saturday, February 3rd, and was very successful, and well attended. Many of our members, and their families participated in the walk/run



If you're interested in this, please go to Florida Cancer Specialists Foundation (fcsf.org) for more details. It's a 3-hour commitment every week for 6 months. I've been going every other week for a year at the North Port clinic, Kathyrn Gallagher volunteers at the Englewood clinic. There are clinics in Port Charlotte, Englewood, and North Port.




